Accuracy without authority

Think → Translate → Speak (slow)

“Many presenters aim for:

- flawless grammar
- perfect phrasing”

“But audiences respond more to:

- calm tone
- clear pacing
- controlled emphasis ”

Confidence is perceived, not spoken

Meetings reward presence, not correctness.

“Audiences notice:

- pauses
- stress patterns
- certainty markers ”

3 Tone Anchors




**1. Pace –

silence
